CODE OF CONDUCT FOR SPECTATORS

Where permitted, we are delighted to welcome spectators to attend IAPS events to support the children. As a **spectator/parent** at an IAPS sports event, you have a responsibility to:

- 1. Be a positive role model and lead by example. Children are involved in sport for their enjoyment and without undue spectator pressure.
- 2. Encourage children to play by the rules and respect the officials.
- 3. Always respect the officials and their decisions. Video evidence will not be accepted in any cases to dispute decisions.
- 4. Always respect the coaches and their decisions. They give their time, energy and experience to coach the children.
- 5. Refrain from any form of bad language or poor behaviour towards players, officials and fellow spectators.
- 6. Be friendly and respectful to the opposition.
- 7. Teach children that effort and teamwork are as important as victory so that the result of each game is accepted without undue disappointment.
- 8. Turn defeat into victory by helping children work towards skill improvement and a positive sporting attitude.

- 10. Try to relax and enjoy the event!

IAPS wants all the competitions it runs to run without any negative incidents. Excitement and emotions can run high at events, not least amongst the supporters. Unpleasant and inappropriate behaviour is very rarely seen but you should be aware that **IAPS retains the right to ask you to leave the event, if you fail to comply with the code of conduct**.



EVENT INFORMATION

Parking

School minibuses and coaches should use the Dukes Ride entrance (sat nav RG45 7PT) to Wellington College. Coaches can drop off players and then park by Swan Lake.

Spectators will be directed to park along the Kilometre.



Late arrivals

Please try to ensure that you arrive in good time before your first match. If you miss a match due to late arrival it will result in a 3-0 loss counting against your team and the points will be awarded to your opposition. If you are not present for the beginning of a knock-out match, you will forfeit the match.

Tournament schedule

Please arrive from 8.30am and register at the tournament HQ from 8.45am. There will be a short coaches' briefing to go through important on site housekeeping for all teams at 9.00am; please could you ensure at least one member of staff for your team attends this.

Referees

Each team will need to bring a competent umpire and you will stay on the pitch that you have just played to umpire the game directly after you. You will not be required to umpire your own match. Wellington College Prep and Wellington College will provide umpires for the knockout stages of the Cup competition. Teams that qualify for the Plate and Bowl competitions will be required to umpire the game directly after they have played as per the tournament schedule.

Qualification process

This qualification event consists of a group and knockout stage. The initial stage will be played between 4 groups of 5 schools. The 1st and 2nd placed team in each group will progress to the Cup competition with the 3rd and 4th placed team progressing to the Plate competition and the 5th placed teams will enter the Bowl competition. The top two teams of the Cup competition will qualify for the National Finals day on Friday 15th November at Repton School.

First aid

Please bring your own first aid kits. Wellington College will also have a medic on site on the day, please speak to a member of Wellington College staff at pitch side HQ if you require further first aid.

Changing facilities

There will not be changing rooms available for competitors and there is no under cover storage available for kit. Portable toilets will be available for all players, staff and spectators. These will be located next to the HQ tent.

Refreshments

Please advise students that they should bring their own refreshments for the day. Wellington College and Wellington College Prep will provide tea, coffee and a soup and sandwich lunch for visiting staff and spectators. Refreshments for staff and spectators will be served on arrival and then lunch from 12.00–1.30pm. This will be next to the tournament HQ.

COMPETITION RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Matches will be 7 players per side, with teams made up of 6 outfield players and one goalkeeper. Teams can use squads bigger than 7 if they wish, making rolling substitutions in line with standard hockey rules.
- Matches will be played using standard England Hockey In2Hockey rules for 7 a side junior hockey. The full set of rules can be found here: <u>https:// hockeyhub.englandhockey.co.uk/downloads/modules/5/I n2Hockey-7-sside-Rules.pdf</u>
- All outfield players must have the correct protective equipment to participate, including appropriate shin pads and gum shields. Goalkeepers must have a full goalkeeping kit.

- The first named team will have the choice of push back for the first half, with the second named team having choice of ends. Both will be reversed for the second half.
- In the event that teams have a colour clash, the first named team will be required to either use an alternate shirt if available or play in bibs to differentiate the teams. Wellington College will have a selection of coloured bibs at tournament HQ by the entrance to Pitches A and B for teams to use if required.

GROUP STAGE FORMAT AND RULES

- Matches will be 12 minutes one way with 3 minutes between matches. Group stage games will be timed centrally.
- The group stage will be a round robin format, with each team playing each school in their group once. Teams will be awarded three points for a win, one point for a draw and no points for a loss.
- At the end of the group stage, the top two sides from each group will then progress to the Cup competition. Teams finishing third and fourth in their groups will qualify for the Plate competition, and the teams finishing fifth will play in the Bowl competition.
- If teams finish level on points at the end of the group stage, goal difference will be used to determine the team finishing higher. If goal difference is level, the total number of goals scored, followed then by the head to head result between the two teams will be used to separate the teams. In the event teams are still level, penalty strokes will then be used to decide the higher placed team.

KNOCKOUT STAGE FORMAT AND RULES

- Matches will be 12 minutes one way with 3 minutes between matches.
- In the event that a knockout stage game ends in a draw, 'golden goal' period lasting a maximum of 5 minutes will be played, with the first team to score during this period winning the tie.
- If after 5 minutes of extra time neither team has scored, penalty strokes will be used to determine the winner.

RULES FOR PENALTY STROKES

- In the event that penalty strokes are required, a barrage of three penalty strokes will be used.
- Each team will be required to nominate three players to take one stroke each, with the team leading after three penalty strokes each winning the shootout.
- If teams are still tied after three strokes each, sudden-death will be used until a winner can be decided. Sudden-death will be started by the team that did not start the shoot-out and players may proceed in a different order from the initial best-of-three round.
- For the Under 13 competition, penalty strokes will be taken from the usual 7m distance.

Candidates who are interested in being awarded a Sport Scholarship are invited to attend an Inspire Day in the Lent Term of Year 8. Inspire Days allow students to show their talent, work with our teachers and coaches, and get an understanding of the Sports Extension Programme that will be available to them from the Third Form and beyond. The award of a Scholarship is not dependent on attending an Inspire Day.

Sports scholars benefit from access to a greater degree of bespoke technical and tactical coaching, with support services provided by more experienced external professional coaches. Video analysis support, a bespoke strength and conditioning programme, and the development of their own sporting Individual Development Plan helps enable our scholars to maximise their potential. Our structured 'Aspirational Athlete Programme', which includes support in the four key strands of Physical Development and Nutrition; Psychology and Leadership; Life skills & Wellbeing; and Technical and Tactical development, is a key strand in our provision. Once in the Sixth Form our scholars have access to coaches who have experience of elite sporting pathways, contemporary elite sport, and high-level performance. In addition, many sports scholarships to US universities exist, and Wellington has an experienced team to support students with their applications.
