Photography Advice

There is no professional photography at IAPS Sport events, however parents and spectators can take their own pictures. IAPS staff and representatives may use different forms of media to capture images or film, which will be used as listed in the IAPS media policy. IAPS will be the data controller of these images and it will be protected under our data protection policy.

There is no law against taking photos at public events for personal use, including pictures of other people's children (Ask the Police, 2018). IAPS asks parents and spectators to be cautious when sharing any images on social media.

Membership of IAPS says a great deal about the quality of the school you send your child to for their education.

We provide services to our members offering support and guidance to head teachers and professional training for staff. We also provide opportunities for children to take part in sport and art competitions. We are not a private company solely engaged in running sports competitions.

The annual sports programme offers a range of team and individual events for children who attend IAPS schools. The children are able to compete in a fun, safe and competitive environment. All organisers and qualified officials are passionate volunteers, who help us to deliver the events in line with National Governing Body rules and regulations.

Where permitted, we are delighted to welcome spectators to attend IAPS events to support the children. Our agreed code of conduct highlights IAPS's expectations of spectators, to ensure that all events are enjoyable and fair for the children involved, and we hope you would support us by reading and applying the following code:

- 1. Be a positive role model and lead by example; children are involved in sport for their enjoyment and without undue spectator pressure.
- 2. Encourage children to play by the rules.
- 3. Respect the officials and their decisions at all times.
- 4. Respect the coaches and their decisions. They give their time, energy and experience to coach your children.
- 5. Refrain from verbal or indeed physical abuse towards players, officials and fellow spectators.
- 6. Be friendly and respectful to the opposition.
- 7. Teach children that effort and teamwork are as important as victory so that the result of each game is accepted without undue disappointment.
- 8. Turn defeat into victory by helping children work towards skill improvement and a positive sporting attitude.
- 9. Be aware that IAPS events have comprehensive safeguarding policies and procedures, available on our website: https://sport.iaps.uk/safeguarding
- 10. Relax and enjoy the event.
- 11. IAPS wants all the competitions it runs to pass without any negative incidents. Excitement and emotion can run high at the events, not least amongst the supporters.

Despite this, unpleasant and inappropriate behaviour is very rarely in evidence at our events but you should be aware that IAPS retains the right to ask you to leave the event, if you fail to comply with the code of conduct.

Festival Rules

1. Matches

Each game shall be played between two teams of eight players. A match consists of a maximum of 8 six ball overs bowled by each side. A team shall not be permitted to declare its innings closed. Each game consists of only one innings per team. Batters will bat in pairs, with each pair facing two overs.

2. Length of Innings

The maximum time allowed for the length of an innings shall be 25 minutes, with a five-minute turnaround between innings and between matches.

3. Number of players per team

Only eight players are permitted to play in each game. The eight players nominated to play in the game must be written on the score sheet before the commencement of the game.

4. Bowling

Each member of the fielding team shall bowl one over each with exception of the wicket-keeper. One member of the fielding side can bowl two overs. Bowling will occur from one end to speed up the match time. The wicket-keeper must be nominated before the start of the match, and under no circumstances shall the wicket-keeper be allowed to bowl. During play the wicket-keeper must stand in a normal wicket keeping position at the instant of delivery otherwise a no-ball shall be called. A different wicket-keeper may be nominated for each game but cannot be changed during the course of the game. An over must consist of six balls, except in the final over of the innings where there must be six legal balls completed.

5. Extras

A wide or no-ball shall be counted as two extra runs to the batting team and no extra ball will be bowled apart from the final over where there must be six legal deliveries. Any runs scored from a no-ball (off the bat, byes, or leg byes) will be credited in addition to the extras for the no-ball. Any ball, which after bouncing, passes the batsman above the shoulder height in their normal batting stance or would have passed them above waist height without bouncing shall be called a no-ball.

6. Batting

Teams will start their innings on 200 runs. If a batter is out they will swap ends with their partner and lose 5 runs for each wicket that falls.

7. Fielding Restrictions

No fielder is permitted within a 10-metre radius of the batter, excluding the arc from wicketkeeper to point. The umpire shall have the final say on all fielding restriction decisions. In the event of an infringement, the square leg umpire shall call and signal no-ball.

8. Match Results

A game shall be won by the team having the highest completed score at the end of the game. The game concludes when the target is reached, or when the nominated number of overs is completed, or when the team batting second is completed within the nominated number of overs. Any match or qualification complaint shall be referred to the Match Referee (Andy Northcote, Head of Prep Sport) who will make a determination. Three points awarded for a win and one each for a tie. If teams are equal on points at the end of the pool stages, the winner of the previous encounter between the two teams will progress. If this is still undecided then the least wickets lost followed by most wickets taken will be considered. If teams still cannot be separated then a bowl out will be performed. If more than one team are level on points at the end of the group stages then the highest average run rate per ball will be used. In the case of a tied match in the seeding match ups the winner will be determined by a bowl off. Each team will get five deliveries to hit three stumps. Each of the five outfield players will have one delivery each and the team that hits the stumps most times will progress. If the bowl off is all square after five deliveries it will go into sudden death bowl off.

9. Weather

In the event of weather conditions limiting play, matches will be resolved with a bowl off: Five different bowlers, bowling at three stumps on a spare track. The most hits of the stumps wins (one ball each). A (foot) no ball, renders that delivery void. In the event of it being a draw after five rounds, then it will go to sudden death, with the same bowlers being available again.

10. Spirit of the game

Spirit of cricket The MCC's Spirit of Cricket should upheld throughout the festival. The Match Referee (Haileybury Director of Cricket) must be contacted immediately if any situation arises in which the Spirit of Cricket has not been upheld.


