CODE OF CONDUCT FOR SPECTATORS

Where permitted, we are delighted to welcome spectators to attend IAPS events.

As a **spectator/parent** at an IAPS sports event, you have a responsibility to:

- Be a positive role model and lead by example. Children are involved in sport for their enjoyment and without undue spectator pressure.
- 2. Encourage children to play by the rules and respect the officials and their decisions
- 3. Respect the officials and their decisions at all times. Video evidence from spectators will not be accepted in any cases to dispute decisions.
 - Respect the coaches and their decisions, they give their time, energy and experience to coach your children.
- 4. Refrain from any form of abuse towards players, officials and fellow spectators.
- Be friendly and respectful to the opposition.
 Teach children that effort and teamwork are as important as victory so that the result of each game is accepted without undue disappointment.
- 6. Turn defeat into victory by helping children work towards skill improvement and a positive sporting attitude.
- Be aware that IAPS events have comprehensive safeguarding policies and procedures, available on our website: https://iaps.uk/sport/safeguarding.html Relax and enjoy the event.

IAPS wants all competitions to run without any negative incidents. Excitement and emotions can run high at events, not least amongst the supporters. Unpleasant and inappropriate behaviour is very rarely seen but you should be aware that IAPS retains the right to ask you to leave the event, if you fail to comply with the code of conduct.

EVENT INFORMATION

Parking

Can all minibuses and spectators park at the bottom car park, please use the 'overflow car park' if this is full. Any coaches will need to drop off and leave the campus to return for collection.

Umpires

Each team will need to bring a competent umpire. There will be four external umpires on the day to umpire the bowling end of Group, Cup and Plate matches. School umpires will stand at leg for the opponents' innings.

First aid

Schools will be responsible for their own first aid on the day.

Changing facilities

Please come changed, ready to play, toilets will be allocated on the day. Make a base in the sunshine at your pitch.

Refreshments

Tea / Coffee and biscuits will be provided throughout the day for staff and spectators (Please note spectators will need to bring their own lunch). Players and staff will be given a barbecue lunch, but schools may wish to bring further snacks for the day.)

Late arrivals

Teams arriving late will deem to have lost the match and opponents gain 3pts for a win.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

<u>Aim</u>

1. The enjoyment for, and fair play by, all players.

Pitch

- 2. Two sets of wickets, 17 yards apart.
- 2.1 Boundaries maximum of 40 metres apart but can be reduced to accommodate more matches—most are 35m.

Teams

- 3. Each team comprises of 8 players. Squads are limited to 10 players.
- 3.1 In the event of injury to a player, a substitute will be allowed to field, but not bowl. Should such an injury prevent the player batting, a substitute will be allowed to bat only with the permission of the opposing member of staff.

The Start

4. The two teams toss a coin to decide which team has the choice of either batting or fielding first.

The Game

5. Throughout the tournament each game shall consist of one innings per team, each innings to be 8 overs long.

Batting and Scoring

- 6. The batting side shall be divided into pairs, each pair batting for 2 overs, with a new pair starting at the end of the second, fourth and sixth overs.
- 6.1 Each team starts batting with a score of 200 runs.

- 6.2 Each time a batter is out, 5 runs are deducted and the other batter of the pair faces the next ball.
- 6.3 A batter may be out bowled, caught, run out, stumped, hit wicket. Please shout the scores out after EACH over, to ensure scores are the same at the end.
- 6.5 Runs will be scored in the normal way, as will byes.
- 6.6 3 runs will be awarded to the batting team for each wide ball and no-ball bowled, but no extra ball will be allocated, except in the final over of each innings when, in addition to the 1 run, an extra ball will be bowled.
- 6.7 At the end of the first 2 overs, the first pair of batters retires and is replaced by the second pair until all 4 pairs have batted for 2 overs each.
- 6.8 The second team then bats for their 8 overs.

Bowling and Fielding

- 7. Each player on the fielding side must bowl 1 over, except the wicket keeper (one player will bowl 2 overs)
- 7.1 Bowling will take place from one end only.
- 7.2 Bowling should be over arm.
- 7.2.2. Underarm bowling is unacceptable and the 'double bounce' rule should be applied i.e. if the ball bounces more than ONCE, or rolls along the ground before it reaches the popping crease.

We will be playing rule 7.2.2 in the Tournament.

- 7.3 Players on the fielding side DO need to rotate fielding positions.
- 7.4 With the exception of the wicketkeeper no fielder may field within 10 yards of the wicket, measured from the middle stump except behind the wicket on the off-side. A fielder may move into the restricted area to field a ball provided he/she was outside the area when the stroke was made.

The Result

8.1 The team with the higher score wins.

Group stages

3pts for a win

1pt for a draw

Opts for a loss

If a draw at the end of the group stages;

- the result between the tied teams
- combined highest runs scored
- most wickets taken

Finals Stage

If equal scores, then the team that has taken the most wickets wins, if still equal the team that scored the most runs in the group stages wins. In the event of a tie the team taking more wickets in the group stages will be the winner. If it is still equal, each player bowls 1 ball at the wickets (no batter), with the team scoring the higher number of strikes the winner.

Medals will be awarded to the top three teams.
