CODE OF CONDUCT FOR SPECTATORS

Your school is a member of IAPS, the Independent Association of Prep Schools. IAPS is a school's association with 670 member schools, both in the UK and internationally. IAPS was founded in 1893 and for over 120+ years we have been committed to supporting head teachers in their roles as leaders of the top prep and independent junior schools in the country. Membership of IAPS says a great deal about the quality of the school you send your child to for their education.

We provide services to our members offering support and guidance to head teachers and professional training for staff. We also provide opportunities for children to take part in sport and art competitions. We are not a private company solely engaged in running sports competitions.

The annual sports programme offers a range of team and individual events for children who attend IAPS schools. The children are able to compete in a fun, safe and competitive environment. During the 2018-2019 academic year, 160 events were organised, in 23 sports, with 22,000 children participating. All organisers and qualified officials are passionate volunteers, who help us to deliver the events in line with National Governing Body rules and regulations.

Where permitted, we are delighted to welcome spectators to attend IAPS events to support the children. Our agreed code of conduct highlights IAPS's expectations of spectators, to ensure that all events are enjoyable and fair for the children involved, and we hope you would support us by reading and applying the following code;

1. Be a positive role model and lead by example; children are involved in sport for their enjoyment and without undue spectator pressure.

2. Encourage children to play by the rules.

3. Respect the officials and their decisions at all times.

4. Respect the coaches and their decisions. They give their time, energy and experience to coach your children.

5. Refrain from verbal or indeed physical abuse towards players, officials and fellow spectators.

6. Be friendly and respectful to the opposition.

7. Teach children that effort and teamwork are as important as victory so that the result of each game is accepted without undue disappointment.

8. Turn defeat into victory by helping children work towards skill improvement and a positive sporting attitude.

Relax and enjoy the event.

IAPS wants all the competitions it runs to pass without any negative incidents. Excitement and emotion can run high at the events, not least amongst the supporters.

Despite this, unpleasant and inappropriate behaviour is very rarely in evidence at our events but you should be aware that IAPS retains the right to ask you to leave the event, if you fail to comply with the code of conduct.



EVENT INFORMATION

Parking

Parking is available at our Sports Grounds, Clevedon Rd, Failand, Bristol BS8 3TL. Entrance is on Clevedon Road for all fields and astro pitches. We ask that minibuses park at the end of the car park opposite the tennis astroturf.



N.B. Bristol Grammar School's policy is that it does not allow dogs on our Sports Fields at Failand, this is in the interests of our pupils and visiting team's health and safety.

Late arrivals

Please note that teams arriving late for their match may forfeit any missed game.

Tournament schedule

9.00am arrival and registration.

Equipment

Schools to provide their own kit and equipment to play hard ball cricket.

Umpires & Scorer

Each competing school shall provide a suitable scorer. The scorer must not be a parent. It must be a member of the school staff or a qualified official. Please score your own fixtures. Each school maybe asked to umpire a game when they are not playing.

First aid

Schools should provide their own first aid (and qualified staff member). Bristol Grammar School has ice on site and can support staff in case of an emergency.

Changing facilities

Shared toilets and changing facilities for the players are available in the pavilion and will be signposted on the day, although we ask that staff manage this where possible.

Refreshments

Please could schools bring their own packed lunches for their players. We also ask that all players and visitors bring water bottles to reduce single plastic cup usage. A water tank will be available.

From 9.30am, tea, coffee & pastries for parents and staff will be available outside the pavilion. A buffet lunch will also be provided for parents and staff from 12.30pm, inside the pavilion.

Staff and spectators will also be able to use the toilets upstairs in the pavilion.





RULES

Aim



The enjoyment for, and fair play by, all players.

Pitch



Two sets of wickets, 16 yards apart.

Boundaries – maximum of 35 metres apart but can be reduced to accommodate more matches.

Teams



Each team comprises of 8 players. Squads are limited to 10 players.

In the event of injury to a player, a substitute will be allowed to field, but not bowl. Should such an injury prevent the player batting, a substitute will be allowed to bat only with the permission of the opposing member of staff.

The Start



The two teams toss a coin to decide which team has the choice of either batting or fielding first.

The Game

Throughout the Tournament each game shall consist of one innings per team, each innings to be 8 overs long.

Batting & Scoring



The batting side shall be divided into pairs, each pair batting for 2 overs, with a new pair starting at the end of the second, fourth and sixth overs. Each team starts batting with a score of 200 runs.



Each time a batter is out, 5 runs are deducted and the other batter of the pair faces the next ball.





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There is no LBW law unless the batter deliberately blocks the ball with a leg or foot.

- Runs will be scored in the normal way, as will byes.
- 2 runs will be awarded to the batting team for each wide ball and no-ball bowled, but no extra ball will be allocated, except in the final over of each innings when, in addition to the 2 runs, an extra ball will be bowled. See glossary overleaf for details.





At the end of the first 2 overs, the first pair of batters retire and are replaced by the second pair until all 4 pairs have batted for 2 overs each. The second team then bats for 8 overs.

Bowling and Fielding



Each player on the fielding side must bowl 1 over.

- Bowling will take place from one end only.
- Bowling should be over arm where possible.



At local/ district competition overarm bowling should be encouraged with the first ball of each over overarm every time. If no amount of coaching and encouragement can achieve overarm bowling, even from a base start, then the rest of the over can be bowled underarm.



At County/ National Finals underarm bowling is unacceptable and the 'double bounce' rule should be applied i.e. if the ball bounces more than ONCE, or rolls along the ground before it reaches the popping crease. We will be playing rule 7.2.2 in the Tournament.



Players on the fielding side DO NOT need to rotate fielding positions.

With the exception of the wicketkeeper no fielder may field within 10 yards of the wicket, measured from the middle stump except behind the wicket on the off-side. A fielder may move into the restricted area to field a ball provided she was outside the area when the stroke was made.

The Result



The team with the higher score wins. In the event of a tie, the team taking more wickets will be the winner. If it is still equal, each player bowls 1 ball at the wickets (no batter), with the team scoring the higher number of strikes the winner.

Glossary



An Over - An over consists of 6 balls.

LBW - In the very simple terms, a batter can be given out if the umpire feels that a ball, which hits the batter's leg, would have hit the stumps. This law will not be used unless a batter deliberately blocks or kicks the ball away with the leg or foot.

Byes



If a batter misses the ball, or if it hits their body, they may still run and score byes.



Wide ball



A ball that is too far from the batter to strike will be called a wide. A ball will not be called a wide, no matter how wayward it may be, if the batter manages to hit it.



If a ball results in more than 2 wides, they will be added to the batting team's score and the two runs for the wide will be ignored. For example, a bowler delivers a ball so wide it is missed by the wicketkeeper and crosses the boundary for 4. 4 runs are given to the batting side, not 6.

No ball



If a ball bounces more than once before reaching the batsman, of if it reaches the batsman above waist height without bouncing, it will be called a no ball.



A batsman may hit a no ball and if the shot results in 3 of more runs being scored, that score will count and the 2 runs for the no ball will be ignored. If 1 or 2 runs are scored the batsman will be credited for the 2 runs for the no ball.

Equipment:



Hard ball equipment to be used only.

Tournament Format:

- Eight-a-side pairs cricket
 - Squads of a maximum of ten players.
 - One eight over (six ball) innings per team
 - Each pair bats for two overs
 - All members of the fielding side to bowl one over each with the exception of one player bowling two overs; the wicket keeper cannot bowl.
 - Hard Ball to be used
 - Pitch length 16 yards
 - The boundary will be 30 yards
 - A neutral umpire will be provided for each
 - Pitch Staff will score their own match
