Keynote speakers



The mirror and the telescope: what might our post-Covid educational landscape look like?

Geoff Barton, General Secretary of the Association of School and College Leaders

The mirror: What has Covid shown us about our education system as it is, both its strengths and weaknesses?

The telescope: And what therefore could and should we do differently in the future, in order to make UK education genuinely world class?



The future of learning and the future of assessment

Professor Bill Lucas, Director of the Centre for Real-World Learning and Professor of Learning at the University of Winchester

The interruption to schooling caused by the pandemic has enabled us to stop and think about what we are doing in schools. What do we want to keep? What do we want to change? And what should we stop doing to make sure we are offering the most ambitious version of schooling possible?

In his speech Bill makes a powerful case for a more expansive education that is now offered in most schools and one which does not simply end with a clutch of grades or marks. He urges all schools to be more ambitious in their choice of curriculum, pedagogy and assessment.



The new playbook for leaders

David Marquet, retired United States Navy captain and bestselling author of 'Turn the Ship Around!' and 'Leadership is Language'

Why do we organise the way we do? Why do we run meetings the way we do? Why do we use the words we use when communicating and asking questions?

In today's work environment, we want every team member to be a thinker and a doer. This makes industrial age language obsolete. Instead of running industrial age plays better, we need to cast them aside for a new playbook.

Based on the WSJ bestseller *Leadership is Language*, David explores the origins of our language at work, how it was shaped by the industrial age and the language we want to use in its place.



Beyond the book: leading in times of change

Clarissa Farr, Education Consultant

Drawing on her book *The Making of Us: Why School Matters*, Clarissa will talk about some of the challenges of leading today's schools. Whether

you enjoyed school yourself or are still traumatised by memories of semolina, come prepared to access your own formative memories and take a step back to see how the leader you are today has been shaped. And then, imagine the leader you will be tomorrow.

Helena has successfully led both companies and campaigns over many years and through many setbacks. She is also the mother

of nine (all of whom have attended independent prep schools, both day and boarding) and a Fellow (governor) at Eton. She has therefore seen up close the difficulties heads face in grappling with the many implications of the pandemic alongside unclear or frequent changes in government policy. In her talk, Helena will discuss ways to restore personal energy and rebuild resilience as we emerge from Covid-19, along with the real opportunity to seize this moment for a new level of leadership in the sector.

Inflating balloons of self-belief

James Shone, founder of the Charity I Can & I Am

James's presentation seeks to remind us of the vital role staff play in the world of young people today and that we're not teaching

academic robots but human beings with potential. He adds the vital component of staff wellbeing and how to look after ourselves in order to be better at looking after others. James's relevant, challenging and amusing talk starts with a look at his own personal setbacks and then takes a look at life in education today with advice on how to best navigate the challenges that might be faced. His messages aim to provide young people with the tools to lead a fulfilled and contented life and to avoid poor mental health by:

- Recognising ways to keep their balloon of selfbelief inflated
- Acknowledging their natural strengths and qualities, and how to use them to best effect
- Learning to accept their shortcomings and giving them the tools to cope with failure

These messages are distilled in to his Four Pillars: Belonging, Growth Mindset, Multiple Intelligence and Hope. They provide a lifelong framework to support self-esteem as well as a reassuring narrative in challenging times about self-belief.



Remarkable leadership: give yourself the permission to be courageous

Following the winter in our profession that lasted a whole year, leaders need to be intentional with the stance of courage as we continue to forge our new normal. Staff, pupil resilience and mental health across IAPS Schools

Dr Kathy Weston, Founder Tooled Up Education

In this talk, Dr Weston will deliver the findings of the one of the most comprehensive staff surveys

that IAPS has ever undertaken. The survey was circulated to every IAPS school earlier in the year. It explored both the wellbeing of staff as well as their perceptions around the mental health needs and levels of resilience in pupils. It identified perceived gaps in staff knowledge or training. In addition to sharing the findings with attendees, Dr Weston will place the findings in a wider context of pupil mental health nationally and share practical, evidence-based steps that schools can take to empower staff, pupils and sustain good mental health across their school communities.

2) Computing, online safety and education technology – updates, challenges and opportunities


Dave Presky, IAPS ICT subject adviser

In this session we shall explore developments across Computing, Online Safety, STEM and the wider use of Education Technology.

This shall include reflections on the key priorities of the National Centre for Computing Education (NCCE) and the implications of the UKCIS Education for the Connected World framework. Wider insight shall focus on policy, research, approaches and resources to support digital inclusion, screen use, a balanced digital lifestyle and core future skills.

In the aftermath of Covid-19's home learning experience we shall reflect on key challenges and opportunities learnt from an Education Technology perspective.







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3) Pre-prep and early years - roots to grow and wings to fly

Katie Paynter, Pre-prep and early years subject adviser

The Pre-prep and early years is where it all starts, and without strong foundations it is much harder for children to flourish as they grow, not only academically, but in all aspects of their lives – socially, emotionally and creatively.

This session will explore the changes to the 2021 Early Years Foundation Stage Framework, focusing on requirements in both the 'Welfare and Safeguarding' and 'Learning, Development and Assessment' strands.

Discussions will enable those young roots to be strengthened and ensure the children in our schools have the strongest wings, for their flights into Year 1 and beyond.



4) Achieving an 'excellent' learning success department

Claire Wellington - Smith, IAPS SEND subject adviser

This presentation will focus on key elements which contribute to a successful Learning Success (support) department to ensure high quality SEND provision and outcomes for pupils. Claire will cover provision mapping, Quality First Teaching, managing staff, communication with teachers and parents, training, admin, monitoring and keeping up with advice and resources from your local LA including Education Health Care Plans.

Session A: What does ISEB stand for?

Durell Barnes and Julia Martin, ISEB

ISEB has a great deal to offer prep schools finishing both at Year 6 and at Year 8. During 2020-21 Common Entrance provided continuity for teachers and learners in Years 7 and 8 and the Common Pre-Test provided a mechanism to support transition to senior schools when on-site assessment was impossible.



Durell and Julia will update members on plans to support the teaching of new specifications for 13+ CE, on improvements to be made to the Common Pre-Test and the launch of the iPQ (ISEB Project Qualification). They will also outline other developments to support teaching and learning and assessment in prep schools and beyond as ISEB broadens its position as a centre of excellence in these areas.



Session B: Prep boarding update

Robin Fletcher, BSA

The workshop will look at the current position of the prep boarding sector, trends, issues, developments and the wider boarding market.



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Session C

Strategic opportunities: mergers, acquisitions and sales

Kate Hickey, Harrison Clark Rickerbys

This session gives an overview of mergers and acquisitions in the education sector. Kate will provide an insight into M&A activity in the market now and will discuss the potential opportunities for schools – both in relation to acquisitions for schools looking to expand/grow, and mergers or sales for schools looking to gain support (financial and operational) by joining another school or group of schools. She will explain the legal and commercial differences between a merger and an acquisition or a sale, key issues to consider at the start of a process, how to find the right partner, the steps involved in an M&A process, how best to protect the charity and school in any potential process, and common pitfalls.



Session D Beyond the Classroom (Benefits, Barriers and Best Practice)

Andy Carley, School Outdoor Learning

Benefits – a detailed look at the science, neuroscience and underpinning research evidence to support the claims and what we should be telling our staff, students and parent bodies.

Barriers – an honest and frank look at the things that thwart our efforts with some tips and guidance on how to overcome them.

Best Practice – powerful ideas, latest trends and best methods for delivering and embedding learning beyond the classroom at your school.



Session E Inspections: now and the future

The session will focus on current issues in inspection and will give delegates the opportunity to share their thinking about the strengths and areas for development in the current framework in order to inform ISI's thinking on the new framework.



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Session F

Developing coaching cultures in schools

Julie Keyes, Educational Consultant

Human connection has always been the differential when it comes to great leadership. Over the last year we have seen this to be the case more than ever. In this short seminar we will explore coaching and how it can be used to create deep impact, stronger personal and professional development and, ultimately, better conversations.

We will explore the basics of coaching have a chance to have a short coaching session, identify some models and uses for coaching and finally understand the variety of ways you can introduce coaching into your school.



Session G

Providing opportunities for excellence: fulfilling the potential of 'children in care' through bursaries

A toolkit approach will provide guidance to independent day and boarding schools to include children in care within bursary provision. John will share the story of a collaboration with a Local Education Authority to bring this work to fruition. Delegates will learn about a step-by-step practical process, roles and responsibilities, how to start a placement and how to measure outcomes. Some compelling case studies will bring our attention to the impact and gains of this charitable endeavour.



Session H Building impactful partnerships

Christina Astin, Education Consultant

IAPS schools have good relationships with their local community but many are keen to build closer partnerships with state schools. However, it can be a challenge to move beyond outreach to more meaningful partnership, and hard to know where to start.

In this seminar, Christina will share with delegates a framework for writing a partnerships strategy, practical tips for making the first move successfully and suggestions for how to measure the impact of your partnerships.
