

Q38: How the new Classical Civilisation 13+ exam can supplement and enhance the teaching of the Latin and Greek syllabi

Classics is a subject with great diversity, incorporating everything from great literature, mythology, warfare, science, philosophy and the list goes on. For most colleagues teaching Classics in the prep school system I am sure that they already incorporate various aspects of civilisation studies into their teaching. However, the advent of the new civilisation examination appears to have met with a mixed response, with some colleagues questioning, with already limited lesson time per week dedicated mainly to the study of Latin, how they can facilitate preparation for this new examination. The argument to be made in this colloquium is that this new examination presents opportunities to reinforce language studies, rather than obstacles. Speakers for the day present views from an expert in the field of the Persian Wars, a perspective of how students' learning in the prep system can feed through to their senior studies, and an understanding of what is to be expected of pupils undertaking the new examination paper.

Audience: Teachers of Classics at preparatory school level, particularly those preparing students for the undertaking of the Common Entrance Latin, Greek and Classical Civilisation papers.

Objectives: With the advent of significant changes to the Classics syllabus this academic year for Common Entrance, dominated by the introduction of the new Classical Civilisation 13+ examination, the opportunity presents itself for enhanced engagement in the subject by students. The additional examination paper should not be seen as an added burden for teachers, but rather an opportunity to supplement and enhance the teaching of Latin and Greek language in context. This colloquium endeavours to highlight how and why civilisation studies can be integrated with language studies to enrich the educational experience of our students.
