# Rules & Regulations

## PITCH

Two sets of wickets, 19 yards apart.

Boundaries – maximum of 45 meters apart but can be reduced to accommodate more matches— most are 40m.

## TEAMS

Each team comprises of 8 players. Squads are limited to 10 players.

In the event of injury to a player, a substitute will be allowed to field, but not to bowl. Should such an injury prevent the player batting, a substitute will be allowed to bat only with the permission of the opposing member of staff.

## THE START

The two teams toss a coin to decide which team has the choice of either batting or fielding first.

## THE GAME

Throughout the tournament each game shall consist of one innings per team, each innings to be 8 overs long.

## BATTING AND SCORING

The batting side shall be divided into pairs, each pair batting for 2 overs, with a new pair starting at the end of the second, fourth and sixth overs.

Each team starts batting with a score of 200 runs.

Each time a batter is out, 5 runs are deducted and the other batter of the pair faces the next ball.

A batter may be out bowled, caught, run out, stumped, hit wicket. Please shout the scores out after EACH over, to ensure scores are the same at the end.

Runs will be scored in the normal way, as will byes.

2 runs will be awarded to the batting team for each wide ball and no-ball bowled, but no extra ball will be allocated, except in the final over of each innings when, in addition to the 1 run, an extra ball will be bowled.

At the end of the first 2 overs, the first pair of batters retires and is replaced by the second pair until all 4 pairs have batted 2 overs each. The second team then bats for their 8 overs.

## BOWLING AND FIELDING

Each player on the fielding side must bowl 1 over, except the wicket keeper (one player will bowl 2 overs).

Bowling will take place from one end only.

Bowling should be over arm, and the 'double bounce' rule should be applied i.e. if the ball bounces more than ONCE or rolls along the ground before it reaches the popping crease.

Underarm bowling is unacceptable.

Players on the fielding side DO need to rotate fielding positions.

With the exception of the wicketkeeper no fielder may field within 10 yards of the wicket, measured from the middle stump except behind the wicket on the off-side. A fielder may move into the restricted area to field a ball provided they were outside the area when the stroke was made.

## THE RESULT

The team with the higher score wins

## GROUP STAGE SCORING

- 3pts for a win
- 1pt for a draw
- 0pts for a loss
- If points are equal at the end of the group stage, groups will be decided by:
  - The result between the tied teams
  - Combined highest runs scored
  - Most wickets taken

## FINALS STAGE SCORING

If scores are equal in the Semi Final or Final:

The team that has taken the most wickets wins, if still equal the team that scored the most runs in the group stages wins. In the event of a tie the team taking more wickets in the group stages will be the winner. If it is still equal, each player bowls 1 ball at the wickets (no batter), with the team scoring the higher number of strikes the winner.

# Event Information

## **PARKING**

Please park in the spaces provided on site. We kindly request spectators do not use Eastleigh FC for parking.

## **LATE ARRIVALS**

Teams arriving late will be deemed to have lost the match and opponents gain 3pts for a win.

Tournament schedule

Please arrive from 8.45am, there will be a short briefing at 9.15am. Matches will start at 9.30am. Presentation will be at 5.00pm.

## **UMPIRES**

Each team will need to bring a competent umpire. There will be four external umpires on the day to umpire the bowling end of Group, Cup and Plate matches. School umpires will stand at leg for the opponents' innings.

## **FIRST AID**

First aid Schools will be responsible for their own first aid on the day. A school matron will be on-site if required.

## **CHANGING FACILITIES**

There are changing rooms allocated to each team on the ground floor. Use the side door to access the corridor to changing rooms and toilets. Only staff and pupils are permitted to enter this area, no parents or spectators.

## **TOILETS**

Staff and spectators can use toilets located in the foyer on the ground floor of the pavilion. In accordance with safeguarding guidelines, only school staff may enter the indoor changing rooms and toilets if required.

## **REFRESHMENTS**

Refreshments will be available for staff and spectators in the pavilion from 9.30am and lunch served at 1:00pm. All schools are to provide their own player refreshments for the day.

## **MERCHANDISE**

IAPS are delighted to have Team Elite as our official merchandisers, to sell branded products both online and at events throughout the year. All commission made from merchandise is directly put back into running the sports programme. Merchandise can be bought online or at several IAPS sport events.

## **RESULTS**

Results for team events will be published live using SOCS. Results for individual sports events will not be available live but will be published on our website as soon as possible after the event.

Please note all results are now published in the member area of our website which is only accessible to school staff. Parents should request any information from the school.

## **PHOTOGRAPHY ADVICE**

There is no professional photography at IAPS Sport events, however parents and spectators can take their own pictures. There is no law against taking photos at public events for personal use, including pictures of other people's children (Ask the Police, 2018). IAPS asks parents and spectators to be cautious when sharing any images on social media.

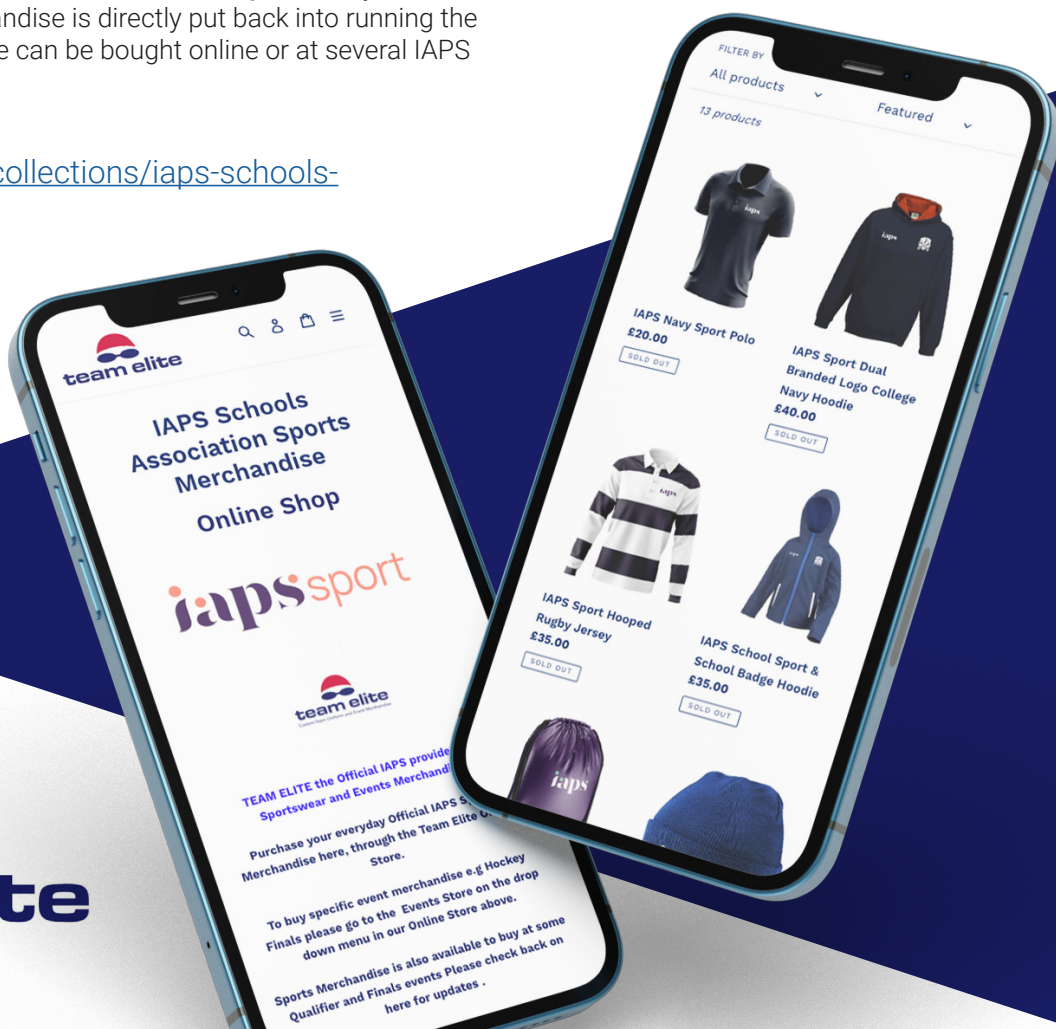

# Code of Conduct for Spectators

Where permitted, we are delighted to welcome spectators to attend IAPS events.

As a spectator/parent at an IAPS sports event, you have a responsibility to:

As a spectator/parent you have a responsibility to:

1. Be a positive role model and lead by example. Children are involved in sport for their enjoyment and without undue spectator pressure.
2. Encourage children to play by the rules and respect the officials.
3. Always respect the officials and their decisions. Video evidence will not be accepted in any cases to dispute decisions.
4. Always respect the coaches and their decisions. They give their time, energy and experience to coach the children.
5. Refrain from any form of bad language or poor behaviour towards players, officials and fellow spectators.
6. Be friendly and respectful to the opposition.
7. Teach children that effort and teamwork are as important as victory so that the result of each game is accepted without undue disappointment.
8. Turn defeat into victory by helping children work towards skill improvement and a positive sporting attitude.

10. Try to relax and enjoy the event!

IAPS wants all competitions to run without any negative incidents. Excitement and emotions can run high at events, not least amongst the supporters. Unpleasant and inappropriate behaviour is very rarely seen but you should be aware that IAPS retains the right to ask you to leave the event if you fail to comply with the code of conduct.

# Safeguarding

IAPS believes that the welfare and wellbeing of all children (young people under the age of 18) and adults at risk attending an IAPS event is of the highest concern. All such persons have the right to safety and protection and any suspicions, concerns or allegations of harm will be taken seriously and will be dealt with swiftly and appropriately.

IAPS expects all adults who are engaged with the delivery of sports events to fully comply with safeguarding procedures as laid out in the IAPS Safeguarding Policy and Procedures, and the KCSiE document (these are available on our website: [sport.iaps.uk/safeguarding](http://sport.iaps.uk/safeguarding)).
