

Q26: how can teachers provide challenge for the more able in mixed ability classes?

Teaching mixed ability is not easy but can be achieved. The emphasis is on Teaching to the Top with high expectations and where possible the use of 'low threshold, high ceiling' tasks, as will be demonstrated in the session. These high expectations should lead to getting students to 'think hard'. We seek desirable difficulty, where we avoid challenge only being seen as 'what we do after we have finished our work'

As teachers we need to consider, what is our repertoire of teaching & organisational strategies for meeting the needs of the more able learners in mixed ability classes? The session will consider effective classroom organisational strategies including using 'Cutaway' to effectively manage a mixed ability classroom

The session will then reflect upon other strategies that extend thinking in a mixed ability classroom including questioning, metacognition and self-regulation.

Objectives The session will draw upon practical examples from our NACE Challenge Award

winning schools, share research findings that underpin these ideas and allow time for personal reflection on the steps each attendee can practically take. There

will also be time for questions related to mixed ability teaching.
