Coeducation at Charterhouse

Building on the success of our coeducational Sixth Form, where girls have flourished since 1971, we now have moved to full coeducation from the age of 13. Following the introduction of girls into the Fourth Form (Year 9) and Removes (Year 10) for the very first-time last September, we have girls in every year group as of this year. As Charterhouse is currently full, the school roll will grow over coming years to around 1,000 pupils, the increase representing additional places for girls. This is being made possible by the creation of another girls boarding house in addition to the three original Houses and the purpose built one that we have opened over the past two years.



Charterhouse has seen first-hand the benefits of coeducation in our Sixth Form, and we are now witnessing those social, cultural and academic advantages being extended to the whole community. Charterhouse's educational approach has stood the test of time. Younger girls are thriving alongside our boys and older girls, and are now benefiting from our commitment to care, independent learning, pupil leadership, and both academic and extra-curricular challenge and breadth.

Girls' sport has been significantly strengthened by the arrival of girls at 13+ and we have been able to extend the sporting choice to all and we now have girls participating in the full range of more than 20 competitive sports and activities on offer.

Sports Scholarships and Charterhouse Athlete Programme (CAP)

Sports Scholarships are available at both 13+ and 16+ entry.

The Charterhouse Athlete Programme (CAP) aims to support and develop sports scholars and performance athletes within the School, from 13+ up to 1st XI level and beyond. Talented individual athletes are invited to join the programme whilst sport scholars are automatically enrolled. The programme is the first insight many of our athletes will have into a performance sport environment.

Enjoying access to top level facilities, Strength and Conditioning sessions, Physiotherapists and an excellent mentoring scheme that seeks to maintain the academic work / sport balance, our selected pupils will be able to enjoy sport and their school career at the same time.

Club Links

Charterhouse is partnered with Guildford Hockey Club for the 2022 season and beyond. Our pitches are the home of the Guildford HC Academy and Performance centre. With over 600 members and 120 volunteers Guildford Hockey Club offers outstanding hockey for children aged 5-18 and has playing members from over 40 different schools. We are delighted to have partnered with them to enable regular hockey to be delivered to so many children, and are thrilled that a number of our performance hockey players are now benefiting from this partnership and training with Guildford's junior teams on a Friday evening.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR SPECTATORS

Your school is a member of IAPS, the Independent Association of Prep Schools. IAPS is a school's association with 670 member schools, both in the UK and internationally. IAPS was founded in 1893 and for over 120+ years we have been committed to supporting head teachers in their roles as leaders of the top prep and independent junior schools in the country. Membership of IAPS says a great deal about the quality of the school you send your child to for their education.

We provide services to our members offering support and guidance to head teachers and professional training for staff. We also provide opportunities for children to take part in sport and art competitions. We are not a private company solely engaged in running sports competitions.

The annual sports programme offers a range of team and individual events for children who attend IAPS schools. The children are able to compete in a fun, safe and competitive environment. Every year, over 160 events are organised, in 22 sports, with 22,000 children participating. All organisers and qualified officials are passionate volunteers, who help us to deliver the events in line with National Governing Body rules and regulations.

Where permitted, we are delighted to welcome spectators to attend IAPS events to support the children. Our agreed code of conduct highlights IAPS's expectations of spectators, to ensure that all events are enjoyable and fair for the children involved, and we hope you would support us by reading and applying the following code;


1. Be a positive role model and lead by example; children are involved in sport for their enjoyment and without undue spectator pressure.
2. Encourage children to play by the rules.
3. Respect the officials and their decisions at all times.
4. Respect the coaches and their decisions. They give their time, energy and experience to coach your children.
5. Refrain from verbal or indeed physical abuse towards players, officials and fellow spectators.
6. Be friendly and respectful to the opposition.
7. Teach children that effort and teamwork are as important as victory so that the result of each game is accepted without undue disappointment.
8. Turn defeat into victory by helping children work towards skill improvement and a positive sporting attitude.
9. Be aware that IAPS events have comprehensive safeguarding policies and procedures, available on our website: <https://sport.iaps.uk/safeguarding>
10. Relax and enjoy the event.
IAPS wants all the competitions it runs to pass without any negative incidents. Excitement and emotion can run high at the events, not least amongst the supporters.

Despite this, unpleasant and inappropriate behaviour is very rarely in evidence at our events but you should be aware that IAPS retains the right to ask you to leave the event, if you fail to comply with the code of conduct.

EVENT INFORMATION

Parking

School minibuses should use the Queen's Drive entrance to the school (Sat Nav. Reference GU7 2BY), then turn right before the barrier and followed Duke's Drive round through the barrier to the bottom QSC Car Park. There will be Charterhouse staff at the Queen's Drive entrance to direct you and then staff at the car park to greet you and show you to the hockey pitches. Coaches will also enter through Queen's Drive, then go through the barrier use the BTT carpark where they can be stacked. Visitors arriving in cars should also use the Queen's Drive entrance and then turn right to use the top sports centre carpark, with overflow parking available in the BTT carpark.



Late arrivals

Please try to ensure that you arrive 30 minutes before your first match. If you miss a match due to late arrival it will result in a 3-0 loss counting against your team and the points will be awarded to your opposition. If you are not present for the beginning of a knock out match, you will forfeit the match.



Tournament schedule

Please arrive to register at the tournament HQ by the entrances to Pitches A and B by 11.00am latest. There will be a short briefing to go through important on site housekeeping for all teams at this time, please could you ensure at least one member of staff for your team attends this.

Referees

Each team will need to bring a competent umpire and will be expected to officiate their own matches during the group stage of the day. Charterhouse will provide umpires for the knockout stage of the cup competition, to ensure that there are neutral umpires for games deciding qualification for national finals. Teams that qualify for the plate and bowl competitions continue to umpire their own matches during the afternoon.

Qualification process

This qualification event consists of a group and knockout stage. The initial stage will be played between 4 groups of 6 schools. The 1st and 2nd placed team in each group will progress to the cup competition with the 3rd and 4th placed team progressing to the plate competition and the 5th and 6th placed teams entering the bowl competition. The top three teams of the cup competition will qualify for the national finals day on Friday 11th November at Cheltenham College.

First aid

Please bring your own first aid kits. Charterhouse will also have a paramedic on site on the day, please speak to a member of Charterhouse staff at pitch side HQ if the paramedic is required.



Changing facilities

There will be changing rooms available for competitors and these will be labelled according to the group your school is in. Please note that these are not pitch side and will not be locked. Valuables should not be left inside. Staff and adult toilet facilities are accessible inside the Sports Centre.

Refreshments

Please advise students that they should bring their own refreshments for the day. Charterhouse will provide tea, coffee and a sandwich tea for visiting staff and spectators.

COMPETITION RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Matches will 7 players per side, with teams made up of 6 outfield players and one goalkeeper. Teams can use squads bigger than 7 if they wish, making rolling substitutions in line with standard hockey rules.
- Matches will be played using standard England Hockey In2Hockey rules for 7 a side junior hockey. The full set of rules can be found here:

- Matches will be 6 minutes each way, with 1 minute allowed for a change of ends at half time. Group stage games will be timed centrally.
- All outfield players must have the correct protective equipment to participate, including appropriate shin pads and gum shields. Goalkeepers must have a full goalkeeping kit.
- The first named team will have the choice of push back for the first half, with the second named team having choice of ends. Both will be reversed for the second half.
- In the event that teams have a colour clash, the first named team will be required to either use an alternate shirt if available or play in bibs to differentiate the teams. Charterhouse will have a selection of coloured bibs at tournament HQ by the entrance to Pitches A and B for teams to use if required.

GROUP STAGE FORMAT AND RULES

- The group stage will be a round robin format, with each team playing each school in their group once. Teams will be awarded three points for a win, one point for a draw and no points for a loss.

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- At the end of the group stage, the top two sides from each group will then progress to the cup quarter finals. Teams finishing third and fourth in their groups will qualify for the plate quarter-finals, and the teams finishing fifth and sixth will play for in bowl quarter-finals.
 - If teams finish level on points at the end of the group stage, goal difference will be used to determine the team finishing higher. If goal difference is level, the total number of goals scored, followed then by the head to head result between the two teams will be used to separate the teams. In the event teams are still level, penalty strokes will then be used to decide the higher placed team.

KNOCKOUT STAGE FORMAT AND RULES

- In the event that a knockout stage game ends in a draw, 'golden goal' period lasting a maximum of five minutes will be played, with the first team to score during this period winning the tie.
- If after five minutes of extra time neither team has scored, penalty strokes will be used to determine the winner.

RULES FOR PENALTY STROKES

- In the event that penalty strokes are required, a barrage of three penalty strokes will be used.
- Each team will be required to nominate three players to take one stroke each, with the team leading after three penalty strokes each winning the shootout.
- If teams are still tied after three strokes each, sudden-death will be used until a winner can be decided. Sudden-death will be started by the team that did not start the shoot-out and players may proceed in a different order from the initial best-of-three round.
- For the Under 11 competition, penalty strokes can be taken 5m from the goal line rather than the usual 7m.
